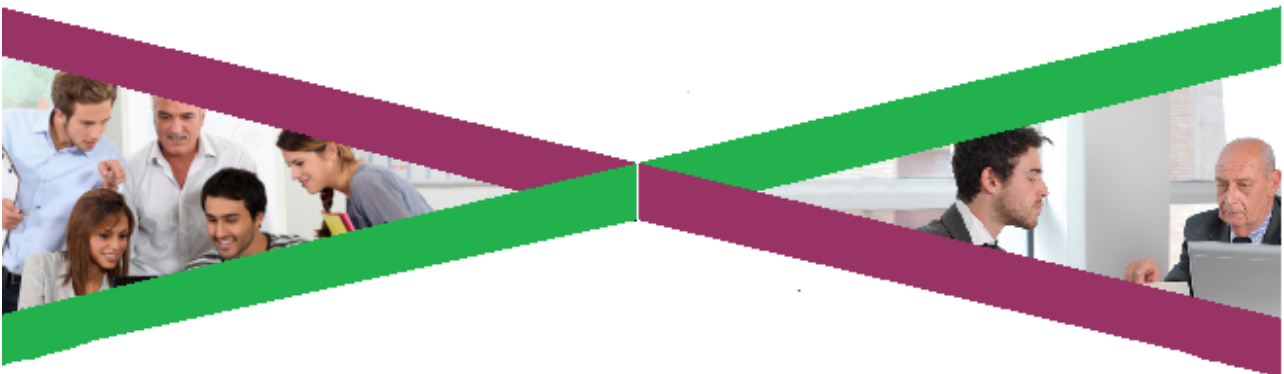

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INTRODUCTION

According to Wikipedia, Open Education is education without academic admission requirements and is typically offered online. The qualifier "open" refers to the elimination of barriers that can preclude both opportunities and recognition for participation in institution-based learning.

For example, institutional practices that seek to eliminate barriers to entry would not have academic admission requirements.

Open Access: Content is provided free of charge for educational institutions, content services and users such as teachers, students and lifelong learners.

THE 5 R'S OF OPENNESS

What does it mean for an educational resource to be "open"? The *5R Framework*, proposed by David Wiley, defines the major characteristics of open content:

Retain

The right to make, own, and control copies of the content

Reuse

The right to use the content in a wide range of ways (e.g., in a class, in a study group, on a website, in a video)

Revise

The right to adapt, adjust, modify, or alter the content itself (e.g., translate the content into another language)

Remix

The right to combine the original or revised content with other open content to create something new (e.g., incorporate the content into a mashup)

Redistribute

The right to share copies of the original content, your revisions, or your remixes with others (e.g., give a copy of the content to a friend)

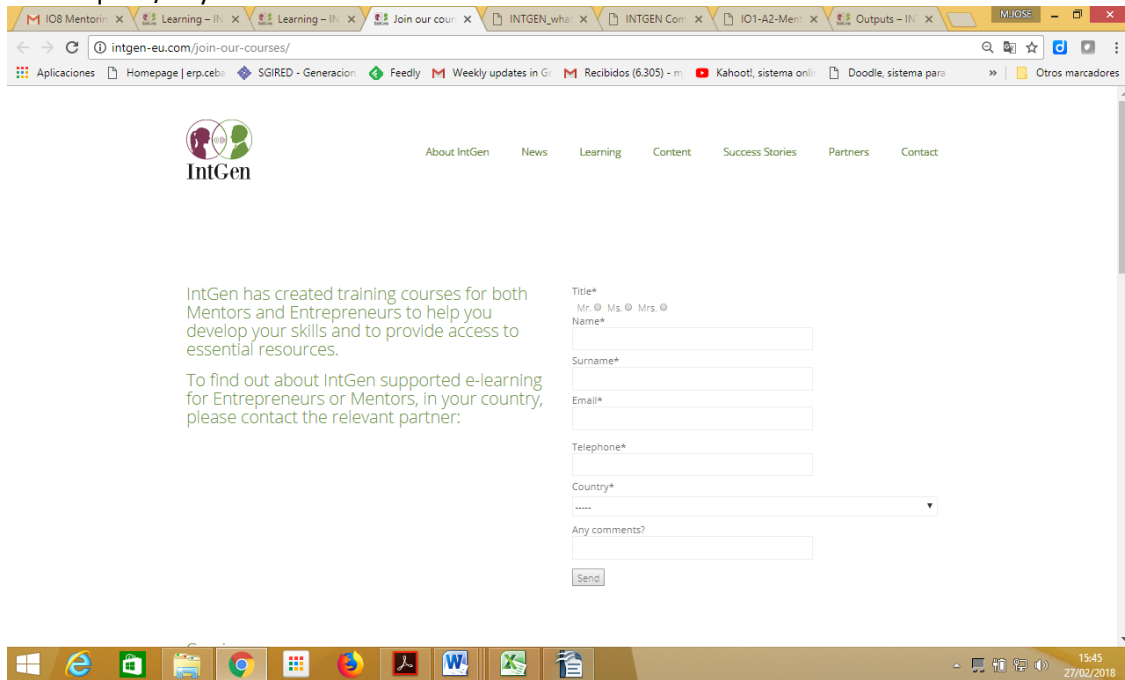
